


### Fall Membership Meeting Glacier Lakes Chapter Sunday, October 30, 2022 Siebkens Resort, Elkhart Lake, WI

An anonymous donor offered a matching challenge up to \$10,000 over and above the other silent and live auction items.

Everyone enjoyed the shop activity stations. Steve Chamraz, primary news anchor at TMJ4 and host of Milwaukee Tonight hosted the Live Auction.

Steve was great to meet and he drew a lot of enthusiasm from everyone. A boat being built by Jane Larson's "LadyBuilders of Boats" was auctioned off for over \$2,000.00. (see at the Waterline April-May-June 2022)

#### **Auction items included:**

a boat build, contractor grade power tools, a toboggan build, Harken Tour and Lunch with Founder Peter Harken, and CEO Bill Goggins. Other items on the auction block included Christian Yelich plaque, jersey, Giannis Antetokounmpo jersey and boat show framed posters to mention a few.

The \$10,000 match was reached, giving AHB \$20,000 over the live and silent auction bidding.

Altogether, from tickets, a live and silent auction, and an anonymous donor who matched up to \$15,000 in a lively paddle-raise, the

Bill Nimke has the talent to bring everyone together for the good!












# We Took the Dog to the Vet and came home with a boat

# Door County Classic & Wooden Boat Festival By Bill Freyman

When was the last time you had the opportunity to examine a home-built two man research submarine at a local boat show? This year's Door County Classic and Wooden Boat Show gave visitors that chance last August. Kevin Cullen, the Assistant Director of the Wisconsin Maritime Museum, accompanied by his family brought the Richard Bennett built submarine to Sturgeon Bay and amazed visitors who discovered what two summers of work and \$28,000 can produce.

Bennett, a retired scuba instructor from Wauwatosa, constructed the sub to go shipwreck hunting in Lake Michigan in the 1980's. He was particularly interested in the rumor of Confederate gold lost in a wreck off Poverty Island. He searched long and hard, but with no luck. Quite a story. It was one of many told by the vessels that attended this year's show. That's what makes the Door County Maritime Museum's show unique-the focus is on the stories behind the boats as well as the boats themselves. It's all about our boating heritage.

This year's show was well attended with 54 registrants displaying everything from a nineteenth century ship in a bottle to the research sub to a glorious Streblow. There were boats whose restorations were barely underway; beautifully homebuilt sail, row, and powerboats; and gorgeous wooden and fiberglass classics. In addition, the show featured its annual Boathouse Sale of used marine hardware, equipment, books, and decorative items. There were kids activities sponsored by the Museum and Green Bay's Hands on Deck. On Saturday evening, the Door County Symphonic Band played a tribute concert for the US Coast Guard on the waterfront. And of course there was the fun Sikaflex Challenge boatbuilding contest.

As usual, we had a chance to use our boats, too. Those of us who could, attended Friday's pre-event Bay to Lake Lighthouse Cruise. The weather was perfect and

we were able to complete the entire route from the Museum to the Sawyer Point Lighthouse on Green Bay to the Coast Guard Station on Lake Michigan and back. Afterwards, we were treated to pizza and drinks to top off the evening. On Saturday, after the band concert, the fleet set out again for a relaxed evening's boat parade around Sturgeon Bay. It's good to get the boats out on the water.

Saturday evening brought fireworks to the event, both man-made and those provided by Mother Nature. Sturgeon Bay's Fourth of July celebration was rained out, so the city fired off its display on Saturday evening. It was a good show. Later, Mother Nature moved in and lit up the sky herself dumping plenty of rain overnight.

Sunday proved to be a drizzly day, but it didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the crowds, which were big all weekend. Many attended the second annual Bloody Mary Social sponsored by Destination Sturgeon Bay. Later, 500 folks turned out to watch the conclusion of the Sikaflex Challenge when the boats and their creators finally took to the water. As usual, it was zany with several sinkings and plenty of entertainment.

Glacier Lakes Chapter members were, as usual, active in helping the show succeed. Not only did members display boats, but they offered boat rides to the public, encouraged the boaters to get to know one another by providing the Boaters' Lounge- tents for the exhibitors to visit. And members met the general public providing information about ACBS and the Chapter. Several of our members were awarded special recognition this year, too.

#### The 2023 show is scheduled for August 4, 5, 6, 2023.
