

After more than a year devoid of boat shows, the 2021 Minocqua Boat Show marked the return of social boat outings, and what a return it was! Marc and Lynn Toigo worked overtime to pull all the pieces together and ensure everyone had a great time. Many thanks to all the sponsors and volunteers who helped make this a fabulous event.

Many of the show participants attempted to dodge rain showers all day Thursday coming into town, some more successfully than others. Thankfully, the showers cleared out for the first event of the weekend, which was a Thursday night Welcome Party at Rich and Beth Lepping's Dry Dock boat shop a.k.a. man-cave. We would all love to have such a cool place to store our boats and associated paraphernalia. Rich and Beth provided food, drink, live music and a wonderful boat-filled venue to start reestablishing connections after a long drought of social exposure.

The scheduling of the show itself was modified from past years, with the show officially starting Friday at noon. Considering that in past years, at least half of the boats were docked by midafternoon on Friday, this was a sensible tweak and the docks were filled with spectators all afternoon. The management of the Boathouse scrambled to have the docks ready for us, with the dock repair crew working feverishly right up until noon to make as many repairs as possible. The boat owners and volunteers worked together to get about 30 or so boats tied up in their slips without any



mishaps, dodging wakeboard boat wakes and submerged pilings that could not be removed in time. Another 30 or so boats were shown in the Boathouse parking lot and adjacent street. The parking lot bustled all afternoon with beer, brat and merchandise sales.

The Friday evening boat parade past the Minocqua-bats Ski Show was moved from the beginning of the ski show to the intermission, and by most accounts this went quite well, aside from dodging pontoon boats there to see the skiers.

The show resumed Saturday under overcast skies, although the predicted showers did not materialize until later in the evening. The awards presentation was moved up from 7:30PM Sat to 3:00 in recognition of the threatening skies. This gave everyone a chance to get to where they had to be or get their boats out of the water dry. The Saturday wrap-up, also a change from previous years, allowed outof-towners a travel day before returning to the grind on Monday.



On Saturday, May 29, Little Bohemia Lodge hosted the 5th annual Manitowish Waters Boat & Car Show.

The promise of gorgeous weather enticed nearly 25 classic boats and canoes, along with about 50 cars. While the morning was cold enough to feel like Christmas, the crystal clear skies and bright sunshine eventually warmed even the coldest fingers and toes.

Additionally, the Manitowish Waters Historical Society Free led free, guided pontoon tours about the rich history of Little Bohemia and how the famous gangster, John Dillinger, escaped from the FBI shootout in 1934. The building has been preserved right down to the bullet holes and shattered glass, and continues to serve as a living history museum.

The event itself was more of a party than a traditional boat show, with live music by Bret and Frisk and enough food and drink to keep people happy. One dad with three young kids said, "This is the most accessible boat show ever! I feel like I can talk to the owners without worrying that I'm bothering them."

Fun, relaxed, and easy going. That's how the day went overall.

Between noon and 1pm, four expert judges (2 boat, 2 car judges) made their way through the rows to make their decisions. Due to the low number of pre-registered boats and cars, some award categories were formed that morning based on attendees.
