The 5th Annual Madison Area Antique & Classic Boat Show (MAACBS) was blessed with great weather and even better camaraderie. After years of challenging conditions (rain, snow..well maybe, etc.), temperatures in the 80's with light breezes were wonderful. Some attributed this year's luck to the MAACBS Planning Committee raising the new yard arm at Christy's Landing to satisfy the boating gods.

On Friday, close to 30 boats made the boat tour on the Yahara Lake Chain. Starting from Christy's on Lake Waubesa, the tour itinerary included Waubesa, Monona, and Mendota. The lunch stop at the Elk's Club on Lake Monona provided a good perspective of the Capitol skyline and beautiful homes on Lake Monona. After lunch, most boats proceeded to the Tenney Locks to venture into Lake Mendota. Mendota is the largest lake of the Yahara Chain of lakes and is home to the University of Wisconsin – Madison campus, Governor Nelson State Park, and the Governor's Residence. More than 30 participants of the boat excursion docked at the Residence and were provided a private tour. It was the highlight of the weekend for those who have never been in the historic build-



" I could do a Chris Craft" by Valerie Strabenow

Those were the six magic words that were all I need to hear to embark upon our search for a suitable wood boat.

Having grown up summering on a lake in southeastern Wisconsin, my memory was full of skiing adventures and boat rides, all accented by those water-borne beauties with the name Chris Craft on the side. My husband, however, grew up on a farm, and because it was populated with John Deere tractors, was considered "green" even in its day. Still, there were no boats in his background. So for him to encourage the acquisition of a Chris Craft was somewhat remarkable.

We were lucky enough to locate a 1947 Chris Craft Deluxe Runabout on Ebay. After being informed by the seller that the boat was sold and he was just waiting for the wire transfer, we then got an email telling us that we could have the boat. It was being stored not far from where

we live, so that made an inspection visit an easy trip.

BCWYWF (Be Careful What You Wish For..[because you just might get it]) then came to join us on Buffalo Lake, an hour north of Madison. I had extensive background in restoring and maintaining old British sports cars, so I figured that an old boat couldn't be any more involved. It didn't have brakes or suspension, and wood is a lot easier to deal with than sheet metal.

With some help from our mechanical-wizard neighbor to tune the carb and adjust the timing, BCWYWF had a wonderful first season with us. We joined the local wood boat club on nearby Green Lake and made the acquaintance of another wood boat legend, Joe Norton. Joe is the consummate artist and his medium is wood boats. His knowledge base is amazing and his boat restoration skills take second to no one. The following year, I helped Joe out in his shop on the restoration of a 1930s utility. In return, I gained invaluable boat refinishing skills and an offer from Joe to help me do my boat. I took him up on his offer and spent the NEXT year stripping, sanding, fairing and varnishing the hull and deck. New upholstery was put in. I then got in line for a new bottom.

Refinishing the top side of the boat was an enormous amount of work. Stripping the old finish off was a messy project, but having had lots of experience refinishing furniture, I just considered the boat the biggest piece of 'furniture' that I had ever stripped. Cleaning the old caulk out of the deck seams seemed to take weeks because it was as hard as a rock. At some point someone had bleached the hull, so sanding took a long time to get the wood back to its original color. After thirteen coats of varnish and hand sanding in between coats, the results were spectacular and so the time was well-spent.

In August of 2009 I got my spot in the shop for the bottom project. All the chrome trim was removed, the engine was lifted out and the boat was turned over. My husband was kind enough to help me for two weekends to take all the screws out of the bottom. It's not hard work, just very repetitive and time consuming. Then the hull boards came off, followed by what was left of the old canvas and the inner floor. Joe's inspection of the frames indicated that there were at least 10 sections that needed to be replaced. One had been damaged during assembly at the CC factory and had held itself together for over 60 years. And so my 'winter' project was underway.

I started with the new frames and under Joe's advice, only took one section out at a time. This was important in

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order to keep the original alignment of the boat. We had some rough-sawn oak planks that had been stored in our barn for over 20 years and this wood was perfect for the new frames. More new skills were acquired in using a planer and a large band saw. One by one the damaged frame sections came out, were patterned, cut, epoxy-coated and re-installed. Weeks turned into months and I slogged along.

The next step was to refit the new inner floor. Using marine-grade mahogany, I painstakingly fit all the sections from stern to bow. Those pieces were also epoxy encapsulated prior to final installation. Then I moved on to replacing the chines. Appropriately sized wood was selected and then the boat-builder needed to take over. Joe carefully laid out and posi-



tioned the chine sections and marked them for cutting. The original chines were in tough shape and very worn. The new chines have a nice, sharp bottom edge to them. Again, there was a lot of trimming, sanding and fitting so the chines fit in correctly. After the inner floor and chines were in position, the hull boards were sanded down to 'new' wood, epoxy-coated and then epoxied and screwed in place. Reinstallation of these hull boards is a small symphony

of three people working in succession, spreading the epoxy, positioning the hull boards and screwing them back in place. At this point I could see the proverbial light at the end of the tunnel... the project was nearing its close. We had come a long way, and it would not have been possible without the guidance of Joe Norton and Tyler Hudzinski. Who is Tyler? Well, he's not just Joe's "assistant". Tyler is one of those rare combinations of a person who can diagnose and repair anything mechanical or electrical, with some great engineering and design skills thrown in, no matter if it's boats, cars, or designing his own solar/wind powered electrical system. When I had a question and Joe wasn't available, Tyler was there to generously lend his time and help.



After two coats of epoxy on the bottom, I applied two coats of

Pettit's Hard Racing Bronze. Previously I had used the anti-fouling bronze colored finish and it had faded to a coppery pink. The boat was turned back over and I prepared it for additional finish coats of varnish on the deck and hull. After the varnish sat for a week, the waterline was repainted. Then the engine was hoisted back in. I had taken advantage of having the engine out to repaint it and replace the motor mounts. Joe and Tyler aligned the engine and the prop

shaft connection and the engine was fastened in place. The following week I reconnected all the hoses, lines and electrical connections and tested the engine. The engine coughed and sputtered, but started and ran just as it always had. It's a wonderful sound.

As I write this, BCWYWF is just about ready to go back in the water for the season. At age 63, he has been 'renewed' with a new bottom and freshened with new varnish. In my mind's eye, I turn from the steering wheel to watch the wake as we streak down the lake. It's a Chris Craft, and that says it all.

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
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
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
